- April 2008-present **Co-founder, *The Story Group***, a Boulder, Colorado-based multimedia journalism company focused on creating compelling public interest journalism on natural resource issues for a variety of print, broadcast and Internet outlets (www.thestorygroup.org)
- Sept 2001-present **Author and freelance journalist** specializing in natural history and environmental politics. Wrote forward to upcoming book *Wild Moments: Adventures with Animals of the North* (U. of AK Press) and a chapter on climate change science for *The Last Polar Bear*, published by *Braided River* books in February 2008. Authored cover stories in *Audubon*, *National Wildlife*, *Smithsonian*, *National Geographic* and *Nature Conservancy* about climate change, arctic ecology, and conservation biology. Published in more than a dozen periodicals, including *The New York Times* and *Washington Post* magazines, *Rolling Stone*, *Harpers*, *Men's Journal*, and *Outside* (www.danielglick.net).
